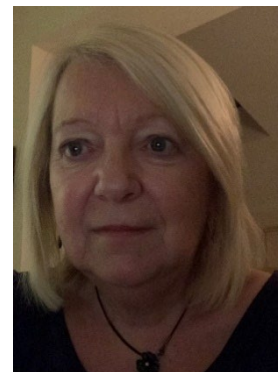


## MESSAGE FROM CHRIS NIVEN, CHAIR OF THE NETWORK

## RUDDINGTON u3a

Ruddington is a small, relatively young u3a, formed in 2018. It serves the village of Ruddington, a long-established community which already had several local societies, eg choirs, gardening, keep fit and local history societies. Potential interest groups and sources of active new members are therefore limited.

The Covid years were problematic, but we have gradually recovered. In February 2023 we exceeded our previous highest membership and we now have 169 members and 19 interest groups.

We have however been successful in obtaining support from Reach Rushcliffe and the Cooperative's Community fund.

In the last year we have had a significant turnover of committee members – four leaving for a variety of health and family reasons but three new committee members have recently joined– in the words of our Chairman – like buses, you wait for ages then three come along at once.

Our relatively low numbers mean that some committee members double up in roles.

The Co-op's community fund will, over a 12-month period, be paying for talks and events aimed at improving the health and wellbeing of our members.

## NEWS FROM THE THIRD AGE TRUST

### FIT FOR THE FUTURE

We hope you have managed to listen to recording of Liz Thackray's presentation to the AGM last October. It is still available on YouTube and you can access it by pasting this link into the address bar of your browser:

Let's look at the background to Liz's ideas. Currently each Region elects one Regional Trustee. Once elected the Regional Trustee becomes a trustee of the Third Age Trust and their first priority becomes the Trust. Becoming a member of the Trust Board involves first, getting up to speed with the business of running a large charity and then actually running the charity (e.g. development, strategy, training, policy making, finance, etc., etc.) and all this takes up a lot of time leaving little time for regional matters and issues relating to the regional u3as. So, the work of a Regional Trustee is extremely onerous and time consuming. Board business and regional u3a business add up to virtually a full-time job. And not surprisingly there are not many members who are willing to take up his role.

Liz Thackray, chairman of the Third Age Trust is looking for solutions to this situation. Her ideas involve a Council (or Assembly) of elected regional representatives who would truly represent the regions and the regional u3as. This sort of arrangement would make our representatives' task more manageable and they could better achieve members' needs.

Liz suggests that alongside this Council we would elect representatives to sit on the Board of the Trust – members who have the appropriate knowledge, skills and experience to ensure that the Trust acts legally in accordance with charity and general law and also within the parameters set by the Trust governing document (Articles of Association).

So, we would have two bodies – a Council (or Assembly) and a Board of Trustees. Of course, it would be necessary to establish a channel of communication and liaison between this new Council and the Board. The Board would fix the budget but would not tell the Council how it is to be spent or what to do. The two bodies would be inter-dependent. The Board would not exercise control. The Council would make decisions in all matters except budget, structure or all the legal things that a charity has to do.

Right now the Trust is experimenting with a pilot. A steering group has been set up to trial two pilot council meetings of elected representatives of the Regions and Nations plus chairs of the six Trust committees and the Chair of the Network Link. In time Liz hopes that the Council will become a bigger body and would like to see more than one representative from each region.

So, you are encouraged to read all the information about these ideas – on line, on the Trust website, in the Third Age Matters magazine known as TAM, and in our local newsletters. ### SO – WHAT HAS THE THIRD AGE TRUST EVER DONE FOR US?

Well, they have 70+ designated Subject Advisers on all sorts of topics for Study Groups – everything from Amateur Radio to Yoga. There are over 70 Interest Groups Online that you can join from anywhere in the country. They also provide excellent events too, open to all u3a and their members.

#### Yeh, ok, but....

They send round a national e-newsletter on matters of interest and the doings of u3a and their members – sign up at: <https://www.u3a.org.uk/> And they publish Third Age Matters magazine (TAM) which is delivered to your door for 0.67p an issue for a 90+ page really great magazine. And now they've started podcasts, produced by u3a members with experience in broadcasting!

Oh, and they give excellent advice on everything from finance (special workshops on that one!) to finding more Interest Group leaders and committee members – not only general advice, but answering specific problems when local u3a ask them.

#### Yes, but....

And they created a model constitution for local u3a which keeps us all legal and operating to best charity commission practice

They also do branding and marketing materials to help us present a lively and professional 'look', and attract new members

#### But do they help us with insurance?

Yes, they have national insurance policies which cover both the local u3a and also all the individual members when involved in any u3a activity. And all trustees have full Indemnity Insurance – including from the time they're a Steering Group forming a new u3a (oh yes, they also give a start-up grant)

Also, for those local u3a that want to use it, they have a 'Beacon' system for managing membership, keeping records, and managing Study Group membership and activities.



Is that all? Hmmmmm . . . .

Oh, I forgot to mention that they help new u3as get set up and going, and they support regional/national networks of u3a so they can support and learn from each other.

Any good in a crisis?

They gave great advice during Covid, both about being safe and what could be kept going, as well as providing high quality events on line available to all u3a and their members during the pandemic.

Do they speak up for us 'oldies', tho'?

Yes, they do, working with other charities and groups to make the case for aging well and gracefully!

Anything new on the horizon?

Two great new initiatives. One is branded merchandise – anything from pens to sweatshirts, branded with your u3a name or the name of your particular Study Group. AND a new Discounting Scheme which will easily save you double or more the cost of your u3a Annual Sub if you sign up and use it.

Oh ok, I give in! Maybe it is a good idea to have a Third Age Trust to support all the local u3a, and maybe it is good value for money for the amount we pay....

### A Statement from Liz Thackray, Chair of the Third Age Trust

Board Review of Changes since October 2022 AGM

In response to criticism following the 2022 AGM, the Board committed to a programme of actions that would improve transparency, consultation and member engagement. At the Board meeting on 29 March, we reviewed that programme to see what was working and what actions still needed to be completed.

Having spoken to many u3as and local Trustees after the AGM, it became obvious that whilst some u3as and some individual members sought more information about finances or other activities, there were many parts of the movement where additional detail or repeated information was unwelcome. Therefore, our focus has been on ensuring that as information and more detail was made available, it would be more easily accessible for those who want it, both via the website, and through talks and special mailings.

## Main Principles

A number of crucial principles were initially agreed that all Board members would commit to, which would guide our future actions in decision making and in our ongoing work and communication with the u3a membership:

1. Be clear and responsive as a Board
2. Demonstrate that we are both listening and responding to members
3. Demonstrate that we have learned lessons and recognised and addressed our mistakes
4. We also recognised that in order for members to understand why and how the Board makes decisions, we need to improve the accessibility and visibility of information, and improve the channels used to communicate with u3as and u3a members. Proposals need to be justified with appropriate evidence.

## Accessibility of Information

A dedicated section on the website, [Trust and Trustee Updates](#), now contains regular updates on a range of activities, with regular links going out to u3as, regions and networks. The section can be accessed on [the u3a website](#). Members are required to sign into the website in order to access this section.

- Summaries of all recent Board meetings
- Half-year finance report, Reserves and Investment Policies. (In addition to circulating Finance News Extras to u3a Treasurers.)
- Trust Annual Report and draft AGM Minutes
- Staff roles and hours graphic
- £4 subscription breakdown
- Summary of the CEO's report to the Board

## Improving Communication Channels

The structure of the u3a movement creates challenges for communicating consistently and regularly with the u3a membership. We hope that during the pilot phase, the introduction of a u3a Council will provide greater opportunities to improve representation and engagement, and to justify and enable u3as to propose and prepare for any future changes.

The following additions to our communications have been introduced:

- Ask The Staff sessions are being held monthly on Zoom, and Ask The Chair, and Ask The CEO sessions will continue throughout the year.
- Each main Newsletter now includes an article featuring a member of staff, explaining their role.
- Special single-topic Mailings are being issued – Finance News Extra, Fit For The Future and u3a Council mailings are examples.
- Latest Update Mailings are now issued twice monthly updating on various activities.
