Kent Castles and Gardens u3a holiday July 2023

It was a fine morning as our coach picked up 44 members from Ashfield, Hucknall and Ravenshead u3as on our bespoke tour. A smooth cruise down to Kent for our arrival at 4pm at the King Charles Hotel Gillingham where we settled in and enjoyed a good evening meal.

Tuesday - Chartwell

The estate which originated in 1382 was purchased by Churchill around 1922 for £5,000. The house has a very homely feel and the visitor can easily imagine the young Churchills running through corridors, up and down its staircases playing hide and seek. A separate building used as a studio houses many of Churchill's art work.

The gardens are a mix of hidden ponds and walkways with a lake that is home to the striking red beaked black swan.

Wednesday - Leeds Castle

Originally a wooden structure and later re-built as a Norman stronghold, in 1278 the castle was bought by Edward for his Queen Eleanor. In 1519 Henry V111 transformed it for Catherine of Aragon. Fast forward to 1926 when its last private owner Olive Lady Ballie bought the castle for £180,000. She redecorated the interior and added 16th century features. The apartments ooze glamour, wealth and opulence. Leeds Castle became the place to be and invitations for a 'weekend retreat' were much coveted.

Thursday - Penshurst Place and Gardens

Built in the style of a defended manor house, this is one of England's oldest family homes. Completed in 1341, much of it remains in its original state with two wings joined by a magnificent central hall that would have been hard to surpass for size and splendour. The walled gardens, 600 years old and amongst the oldest in private ownership, are divided into secret and intimate gardens through arches and tunnels cascading with sweet blossom of roses and clematis. Penshurst was used in the BBC filming of Wolf Hall.

RUDDINGTON AND DISTRICT u3a

Despite the "summer" weather members have been out and about on a variety of visits including to National Garden Scheme gardens, Ruddington's village museum, and a guided historical tour of the village.

One member has successfully established a CAMEO (Come And Meet Each Other) group. It is aimed at single people who may not want to go out alone and who would appreciate someone else's company. So far, in 2s or 3s, they have visited the theatre or cinema or, simply met up for a coffee in the village. During one chat they realised that producing a full roast dinner for one was a bit of a waste so a Sunday pub lunch with others from the group was a good idea.

A very successful visit was to the Jubilee Campus of Nottingham University to the GSK carbon neutral laboratory for sustainable chemistry. Don't be deterred by the chemistry, the main feature was a tour of the multi award winning building. Designed to be carbon neutral it has an impressive number of environmental features which make it possibly the most advanced of its type in the world. An interesting and informative visit which cost £5 for the university's parking charges!



One side of the roof is green, the other is solar panels. The curved "chimneys" are part of the ventilation system.

Another very interesting visit was to the Aeropark next to East Midlands airport. It is both an aviation museum and a viewing area where you can study the preserved planes of yesteryear or watch the modern airliners of today taking-off and landing. It has a collection of 27 complete air frames on external display within the park with another 5 aircraft under complete restoration and 4 aircraft sections some of which were open. By arrangement we visited on a Tuesday when it was not open to the general public. Divided into groups of 6 or 7 we were taken inside 3 planes and a helicopter.

The very knowledgeable guides explained the controls on the flight deck and some were able to sit in the pilot's seat. Particularly impressive/ frightening was the Vulcan designed to deliver Nuclear bombs and the only surviving original Nimrod, a spy plane. A sea King helicopter which had a role in the Falklands war had patched bullet holes. This trip cost £5 per head and is highly recommended to u3as as very interesting and good value for money visit. Guided tours are only available on Tuesdays when the park is not open to the general public.



RADCLIFFE ON TRENT u3a

Attractions were all around, many within easy walking distance of the Albert Dock, within which were the Maritime Museum and the Tate Gallery of the North.



A short walk to the Pier Head was the Museum of Liverpool and the Mersey Ferry, a trip on which some members enjoyed. The Liverpool Museum is a modern one which shows the complete history of Liverpool, from when the council borrowed £7,000 to build the first dock, to the musical explosion of the 60's through to now when the city has been transformed.

Another popular attraction was the Open Topped Bus that visited many interesting places including the Beatles' homes.

Later, speaking to many of the members on their experience I was particularly pleased that they commented on the friendliness of my fellow 'Scousers'.

Indeed, many said that they would return for a longer visit as there was so much more to see and it could be that we may consider returning next year.

Over the years there has been a host of activities including regular quiz nights, petanque, indoor bowls, skittles, Ladies day at the races, visit to the Mansfield recycling centre, Segway at Clumber Park, Detectives walk around Nottingham and so many more. Here are some examples:

August 2013: Gliding: We took to the skies on a 'gliding experience' at Darlton Gliding Club. And what an experience! We were strapped into parachutes, had the controls explained and were whisked up into the skies above Tuxford at the end of a long cable that winches the glider (very quickly and steeply) into the air. Up there, it was exhilarating to see a patchwork of farmland in the Trent valley.





May 2014: British Gypsum: A visit to the underground mine and factory at Barrow-upon-Soar. We were driven deep into the mine, and then walked through a maze of tunnels to the face, it was equally fascinating to see what happens to the rock when it surfaces, and how it ends up in 25kg bags ready to be dispatched. Some impressive machinery involved there, both above and underground.

April 2015: Ibstock brickworks: A guided tour around the brickworks following the brick production from the clay through all the processes to the finished result. Most of us had no idea this was so close to Arnold and unaware of the scale of this production.



July 2016: Adventure Day: A day of gorge walking and abseiling. What a day and something awesome to tell the grandkids! The photos say it all. A thoroughly recommended adventure.
