FIT FOR THE FUTURE – A WORD FROM LIZ THACKRAY, CHAIR OF THE THIRD AGE TRUST

I was disappointed not to be able to join you on 24th January. Unfortunately, I picked up a rather nasty chest infection in London the previous week, while visiting u3as and attending the Board meeting. Fortunately, Allan Walmsley was able to make the presentation and lead the discussion on Fit for the Future. I will not reiterate what he said, but I will provide a little additional background from my perspective and say why I think this proposal is important for the future of the u3a movement.



During the 12 months before I became Chair, two reviews were undertaken. One focused on strategy, updating the development plan for a post-covid world. The other focused on governance. As a new Chair, who had not previously been a member of the u3a Board, I took time to digest the reports and recommendations. I became increasingly aware that change was needed and in March 22 I wrote a 'think piece' for the Board outlining my thinking.

Our current governance structure is essentially that which was established by our founders in the very different world of 1982. Since then, the demands on charity trustees have become more onerous. In the Third Age Trust, our trustees are required to be both charity trustees and company directors. In addition, they undertake two other roles as regional or national representative and first port of call in their region or nation when a u3a requires help or support. This can amount to a full-time job, something few u3a members are willing or able to undertake.

In my 'think piece' I recommended we consider following the example of other similar charities by creating a Board more fitted to fulfilling our legal responsibilities, together with a council that would enable the voices of u3as to be heard and responded to. This was the start of Fit for the Future and a journey to explore what might work best for the u3a. From the start it was clear that the u3a model must be protected. We are a volunteer led mutual aid organisation. But we need to enable members with appropriate knowledge and skills to become Trustees and keep us legal. At the same time member voices are paramount in development activity. And u3as must receive appropriate support when advice is required.

In my election address, I said change would be needed. At the time, I did not know what that might be. It is not u3as that need to change, but the infrastructure needs to be one that enables the voice of u3as to be heard and enables those who volunteer to know they will continue to have time to enjoy their u3a membership as well as using their knowledge and skills to serve the movement.

The Garden Group visited the beautifully decorated Belvoir Castle the theme being the 12 days of Christmas.

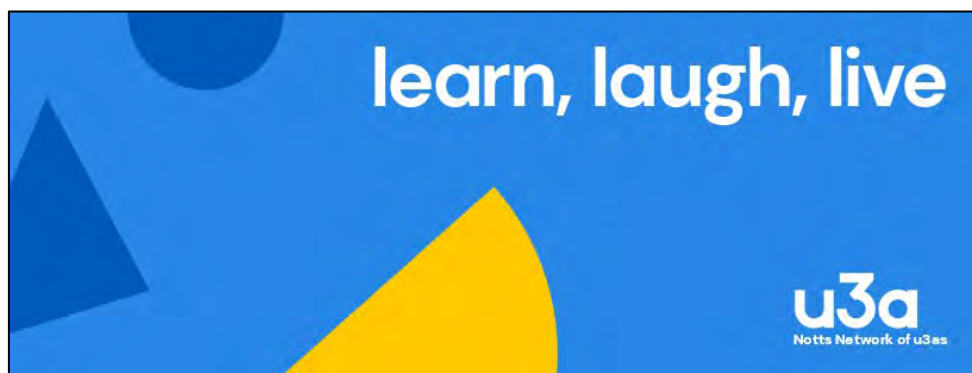


The Christmas Spectacular at Thursford was a hit with members, so much so that the wheels are in motion for another visit in December 2024!

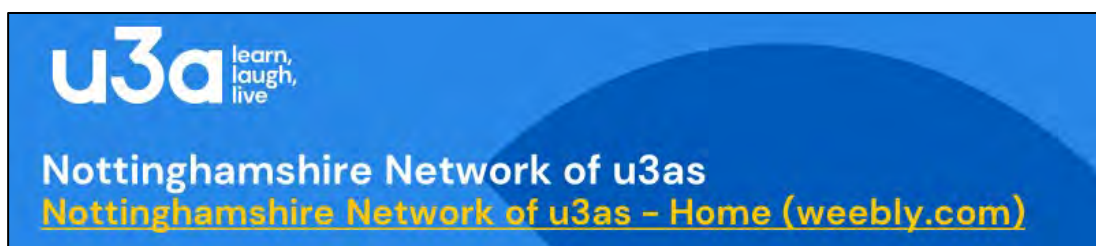

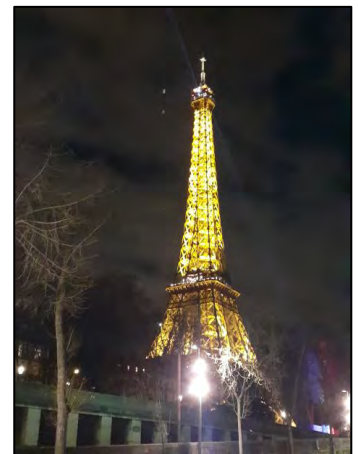
Paris Tour with Van Gogh Exhibition
